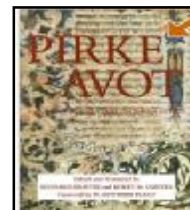

Program Notes for Adult Education - March 2006

The Jewish Ethical Tradition


March 5 and 19: *Pirke Avot, An Introduction to Jewish Ethics - Parts 2 and 3.* Many famed Jewish maxims — among them, the sage Hillel’s famed distillation of the Torah into a phrase short enough to be recited while standing on one foot, “What is hateful to you, do not unto your fellow” — are found in a slender yet rich tractate of the *Mishnah* called *Pirke Avot*, “Sayings of the Ancestors.” Assembled in the year 200, it became a venerated classic of Jewish ethical literature.

These two sessions, following on the February 26 initial discussion, will focus on a contemporary edition of *Pirke Avot* that combines an excellent English translation with both classical and contemporary commentaries. Those planning to attend are advised to pick up the edition of the work recommended by the discussion leader, Rabbi Art Blecher: *Pirke Avot: A Modern Commentary on Jewish Ethics*, edited and translated by Leonard Kravitz and Kerry M. Olitzky; ISBN 0-8074-0480-2; Amazon price: \$10.17.



Rabbi Blecher recommends that participants read the following chapters prior to the sessions:

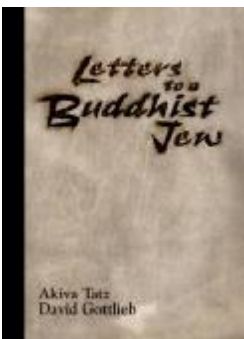
- March 5: Chapter 3 – Know Where You Came From; Know Where You are Going
Chapter 4 – Who Is Wise?
- March 19: Chapter 5 – The World Was Created by Ten Statements
Chapter 6 – Whoever Studies the Torah for Its Own Sake

David Gottlieb, the co-author with Rabbi Akiva Tatz of *Letters to a Buddhist Jew*, will be talking about the book at Beth Chai’s Shabbat on **April 28**. Letter from the Education Director — March 2006

Dear Congregants,

Thanks to all those who participated so enthusiastically in our study session on *He, She and It*. It was a lot of fun to share this work with you.

A few highlight from recent classes: The 4th grade was enjoying learning Hebrew so much one week that they spent the entire time doing just that. They now have *machberrot* (Hebrew notebooks) to record the many words they are learning.

The K/1 class recently finished a unit of Jewish life cycles. On the day that they discussed mourning and remembrance customs they each went home with a Yartzheit (memorial) candle. It happened that one of the children's pets had died when they were at Sunday school. The child found solace in lighting the Yartzheit candle in memory of the pet.

March is the month of both **Purim** (see box below for all the details) and our wonderful **Beth Chai Auction** (see front page article). One of the highlights of a shetl Purim were the *purimshpiels* — little skits that the members put on, mostly making fun of the rich and famous. Any rich and famous folk you feel like making fun of? Please let me know.

Another custom of Purim is to give gifts of food to the poor. We will be assembling fruit baskets for both the Latino Transitional Housing Partnership (LTHP) and the Hebrew Home of Greater Washington. **Please bring a variety of fruits and nuts with you on March 12.** Remember that older folk cannot always eat the hard-to-bite-into kinds of fruit.
